



Delaware is the traditional and current homeland of the Lenape and Nanticoke People.

Lenape, whose name means "the People", have lived in this region for thousands of years. They are "the first people of the first state." The Lenape are a peaceful, close-knit people. The Lenape hold nature as sacred, and they are committed protectors of the environment. In 2021, the Lenape Indian Tribe of Delaware began work to create a Lenape Cultural Center to restore a piece of land to them and to provide a place to share "where they came from, where they are, and where they are going."

Information about the Cultural Center and ways to support

The name Nanticoke means "people of the tidewaters." The Nanticoke are a small and close-knit community. The Nanticoke are proud of their ancestors, culture, and their tribal community today. They share their history and culture through the Nanticoke Indian Museum cultural events, presentations, and their annual Powwows. Powwow means "gathering of Native People." Thousands of people from across the region attend the Nanticoke Indian Powwows, where the beauty and power of the heritage and culture is celebrated and shared through music, dance and arts & crafts. Currently, the Nanticoke Indian Association is renovating the Nanticoke Indian Community Center, with plans to double its size, to help "grow their impact."

This Statement notes the importance of backing up words with actions and includes ways in which we can and do support tribal communities.
