**Ideological oppression = root of social inequity** 



**Institutional oppression = systems that support identities with power** 



Interpersonal oppression = things people say and do that reinforce ideological and institutional oppression



Internalized oppression = how people with identities that do not hold power interpret and internalize experiencing oppression



#### Ideology

People with intellectual disabilities are not as intelligent as people who are neurotypical



#### Institutionional

The legal system ruled it was legal for employers to not hire a person because they have an intellectual disability.



#### Interpersonal

A child with an intellectual disability is bullied at school and is called "supid" or "slow."




#### Internalized

People with intellectual disabilities feeling like they will never be able to get a job or have a family. Feeling like they are less than everybody else.


